REPORT OF THE SELECTMEN,

FOR THE YEAR ENDING FEBRUARY 1, 1862.

The duties devolving upon the Board of Selectmen, during the past year, have been more than ordinarily arduous; occasioned, in part, by the numerous matters specially referred to them by the town, but more particularly by the disbursement of the Appropriation for Military Relief, requiring, as it did, personal inquiry to be made in the case of each applicant for aid, so that the interests of the town might be protected.

At a special meeting in June, the town voted to instruct the Town Clerk to prepare a complete history of military affairs, so far as related to this town; thereby relieving us from what would otherwise have been our agreeable duty, to speak in terms of deserved eulogy of our own Company, the Lawrence Light Guard, Capt. John Hutchins, who so promptly responded, with full ranks, to the requisition to march at a day's notice, under our fellow-townsman, Col. Samuel C. Lawrence, of the gallant 5th Regiment, Massachusetts Voluteer Militia, for the defence of the Capital. We would also have appropriately mentioned the liberal contributions of the citizens generously tendered for the aid of the Company, and the relief of the families of its members while absent.

MILITARY RELIEF.

An appropriation of \$5000 was made by the town, at a a special Meeting, held June 13th, to be disbursed under the direction of the Selectmen, in accordance with a law passed by the Legislature at the special session in May. (General Laws, Chap. 222, Sec. 1.)

Of this amount we have drawn orders on the Treasurer, for \$1632.79, to date of our Report; our return to the State Authorities made up to Jan. 1, showed the payments to that date to have been \$1356.79, the whole of which we claim

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from the State, although we have reason to fear that, the stringent rules by which those returns will be audited, will somewhat reduce the sum to be reimbursed.

In our appropriations we have been generally guided by the amount which could be reclaimed from the State, but in spe-

cial cases we have exceeded that sum.

We recommend an appropriation of \$2000 under this head.

APPROPRIATION TO REIMBURSE COL, SAMUEL C, LAW-RENCE, TREASURER.

On the 5th November last, the town voted to authorize the Selectmen to draw their Warrant upon the Treasurer in favor of S. C. Lawrence, Treasurer Lawrence Light Guard for \$1130.95.

Before any action had been taken by the Selectmen, we were enjoined, by the Supreme Court on petition of sundry inhabitants, from drawing our Warrant and the Treasurer from paying the sum named, until further action of the Court. Wishing to carry into effect the vote of the town, so far as we could do so legally, we took advice of F. C. Loring, Esq., of Boston, who gave his opinion as follows: "In my opinion the vote appropriating money to pay for uniforms was illegal, and unauthorized by law, and the Selectmen should not take measures to remove the injunction." Acting upon this opinion, we decided to take no action in the matter; subsequently, however, we were subpæned into Court, but on application of Col. Lawrence we accepted his proposition, viz; he being the party in interest, was to appear and answer, paying all costs, and to hold the town harmless, he to give his bond for \$1000, which has been done.

LAWRENCE LIGHT GUARD ARMORY.

The Committee appointed to obtain a suitable Armory for the Lawrence Light Guard, reported that they had selected rooms in J. M. Usher's new Block, at an annual rent of \$200. The selection was approved.

The Town Hall having been used as an Armory by the Company after the burning of American Hall, a claim was presented by us to the State Authorities and by agreement

the town is to receive \$110 rent therefor.

ROADS.

The new road and bridge leading from Pearl Street to Somerville Line, has been completed and accepted by the County Commissioners and we have paid James O. Curtis, the Contractor, the balance due him, viz., \$1,100. We recommend that the Street be called College Street.

In accordance with the vote of the town, early application was made to the County Commissioners to change the laying out of the New Street from Forest to Fulton Street—so as to make it more direct. The Commissioners consenting, the location was altered according to a plan made by Messrs F. & N. M. Sargent, so as more nearly to conform to the views of the Selectmen. Proposals were then issued for building the Street and contracts made as follows:

The Street has been accepted by the County Commissioners, and we recommend that it be called Elm Street.

The new Road near Stoneham Line, built a year since, has

been accepted by the County Commissioners.

In the matter of a culvert from Middlesex Street to the River, it was deemed best to defer action until the extension of Middlesex Street was fully completed. The result of our examination of the premises, convinced us that the town was in nowise obligated to incur expense to afford better drainage for lands near South and Middlesex Streets. If natural water-courses have been obstructed or diverted, either by individuals or corporations, to the injury of adjoining land-owners, the remedy is clearly against the parties causing the injury.

LAND DAMAGES IN BUILDING MIDDLESEX STREET.

The award of the Selectmen for land damage in extending Middlesex Street has been accepted — except in the case of E. G. Holmes, to whom we awarded \$60; feeling aggrieved at our action, Mr. Holmes petitioned for and obtained a Sheriff's jury who awarded him one hundred and twenty dollars and costs as we have been unofficially informed.

Pending this action, an injunction was served upon the town authorities restraining them from building that part of the street adjoining Mr. Holmes' land. Amount of damage paid is \$418, the claim of Mr. Holmes not having been

adjusted.

MEDFORD TURNPIKE.

A hearing was had before the County Commissioners, on petition of G. T. Cutter and others, praying that the Medford Turnpike might be laid out as a Public Highway. Under the vote of the town, the Selectmen deemed it their duty to strenuously oppose the prayer of the petitioners, and in this they

were joined by the Town Authorities of Somerville.

The enormous expense necessary to raise the Turnpike to a proper grade, and put it in suitable condition for public travel—needing a substantial fence the entire length—and the large annual outlay that would be required to keep it in good order, especially as it is now frequently washed by high tides, indicate very clearly that the interest of the town requires them to oppose this project by all legal means. No decision in this case has come to our notice, and we trust that the County Commissioners having, during the past few years, compelled the town to build several very expensive streets, will hesitate before imposing this enormous burden.

HEARSE HOUSE.

By vote of the town, the Selectmen were instructed to provide a suitable place for the new hearse. On examination, it was found that the House on Cross Street could be fitted up so as to serve the purpose with small expense, — this was accordingly done.

SHEEP KILLED BY DOGS.

Under the provisions of the Dog Law, James Peabody of West Cambridge presented a claim for the loss of 19 sheep killed by dogs in "Felt's Pasture." After having the Sheep appraised, we settled with Mr. Peabody by giving him an order on the Treasurer for \$54.62, payable from proceeds of Dog Licenses on or after January 1st. We made diligent inquiries, but were unable to ascertain the owner of the Dogs occasioning the damage.

Amount received for Dog Licenses, \$131 20.

SUIT AGAINST THE TOWN.

The town having been prosecuted by Reuben Bacon in an action of tort, on account of alleged illegal acts of the Fish Committee, they were authorized to employ counsel to defend the suit. The case was tried at the last term of the Superior Court, and plaintiff non-suited.

The Malden and Melrose Gas Company having conformed to the requirements of the Board, in respect to the pipe at

Cradock Bridge, legal proceedings were stayed.

4

The County Commissioners granted a final hearing on the petition for gates, at the crossing of the Lowell Railroad at West Medford. Counsel appeared on both sides, but no decision has been made.

BRIDGES AND STREET LAMPS.

Amount appropriated for Bridges and Street Lamps, \$500 00 "expended, - - - \$354 85

After issuing proposals, we engaged Charles Lechonc as Lamplighter, for the year ending January 1, 1863, paying him a salary of \$150.00, providing his services are satisfactory to the town.

OAK GROVE CEMETERY.

The appropriation for this Cemetery was - \$300 00. The Board having made but very slight expenditure under this appropriation the past year, we recommend an appropriation for the next year of \$400.00, with the suggestion that some person skilled in laying out rural cemeteries, should be employed to superintend the expenditure of the money, with a view to improve and beautify the grounds.

Eight lots have been sold for \$152 00, and the amount paid

over to the Treasurer.

It is perfectly obvious that the policy of the town should be to encourage interments in this cemetery, and we recommend that the town instruct the undertaker not to inter any bodies in either Cross or Salem street cemeteries, except in the case of owners of tombs or lots.

WATTS TURNER CASE.

Acting under the instructions of the town, this case was carefully examined, and after taking legal advice, considering the expense already incurred, and the probable cost of legal proceedings, as well as the very doubtful probability of recovering anything, our conclusion was, that the interests of the town would not be promoted by taking any steps to collect the expense of Mr. Turner's support from the real estate devised by his father.

There has been paid an execution in favor of the town of Groveland, amounting to \$381.75 which is explained in Re-

port of Overseers of the Poor, Feb. 1, 1861.

INCENDIARY FIRES.

Reference to the Report of the Board of Engineers, will

show the amount of loss by incendiary fires.

Special attention was given by the Board to this matter, and having offered a reward of \$500.00,—the highest sum legally permitted—for the arrest and conviction of any incen-

diary, in order to meet the wishes of many of our most respected citizens, we employed a night watch for some weeks, increasing it on Saturday and Sunday nights. We also consulted with the Chief of Police of Boston, who kindly detailed one of his officers for special duty in Medford. After some weeks service, Mr. Twombly arrested a party suspected of setting fire to Mr. Ford's barn, near Ship street. This person was examined before Justice Hayes, and held for trial.

The large amount of police service has considerably increas-

ed the expenditure in this department.

The lock-up being in a bad condition, we recommend an appropriation of \$50.00 to repair it.

INSURANCE OF TOWN PROPERTY.

In order that proper records may be made of the various policies on Town buildings, as well as the notes given for such insurance, we recommend that the town authorize the Selectmen to effect all future insurance, and instruct them to keep a complete record of the same. Hitherto the insurance has been effected by the various Boards, and in several cases of assessments we have found it very difficult to find either the policies or notes.

The duties of Town Clerk being largely increased, we recommend that \$50.00 be added to his usual salary for the ensuing year.

GUIDE BOARDS.

We recommend that suitable Guide Boards be erected at the corner of Park and Washington streets; also at the junc-

the corner of Park and Washington streets; also at the junction of Forest and Elm streets, and Elm and Fulton, at corner of Pearl and Main streets, and on South street near Winthrop bridge; also at corner of Main and Summer streets.

SELECTMENS' ROOM.

In concluding our Report, we beg to call the attention of the Town to the very inferior accommodations afforded for the meetings of the Selectmen and other Boards. At present a single room of very straitened dimensions, is the only place where meetings of Town officers and Committees can be held, and it often occurs that the room being wanted by two Boards the same evening, one is obliged to seek private accommodations. Besides, the room is very damp, and the ventilation from the windows very offensive. We recommend that the earliest opportunity afforded by vacating any of the rooms under the hall be embraced, to fit up suitable offices for town purposes.

CONDITION OF THE SCHOOLS.

In submitting their Annual Report to the Town, the Committee desire to express their satisfaction at the condition of the schools generally, in point of scholarship, and effective management. In both these respects, they will compare favorably with the condition of the schools at any former period.

CHANGES.

Several changes have been made in the corps of teachers. In the High School, Miss Emma J. Leonard has taken the place of Miss Arabella F. Babcock, resigned. In the Centre Grammar School, Miss Mary F. Dillingham resigned last July, and her place was filled by Miss Susan B. Leeds, for about five months, when she also resigned, and Miss Ella F. Snelling has been recently chosen to fill the vacancy. In the Osgood School, Miss Abby V. Getchell fills the place occupied last year by Miss Sophia R. Earle, in the Intermediate School, and Miss Mary C. Hayden the place which was filled by Miss E. James in the Primary Department. In the Swan Intermediate School, Miss Ellen M. Barr has taken the place of Miss Ellen J. Church; and in the Cradock Primary School, Miss Louise M. Symmes has been succeeded by Miss Eliza B. Barry.

EXAMINATIONS.

The public examination of all the schools took place in July, from the 15th to the 26th days inclusive, and the number of visitors in attendance was large. These public examinations are an interesting feature, and can hardly fail to be productive of good. The stimulus of the presence of parents and friends is salutary in its influence upon minds of the scholars, and the teachers are encouraged to greater exertions. The Winter examination commenced Jan. 20, and closed Jan. 31. It was attended only by the Committee, and was marked for its thoroughness in every department. Each School was tested as to its actual standing; and at the close of each examination, remarks were made by some member of the Committee, pointing out the merits and defects which were observed.

IRREGULAR ATTENDANCE.

Your Committee are constrained to call attention to the evil here referred to, inasmuch as it is one which affects very largely the usefulness of our schools. The sum appropriated for educational purposes is liberal in proportion to the number of scholars and the ability of the people. But that this sum should be expended to the greatest advantage, it is obviously necessary that all our children should be punctual at school; and irregularity in the attendance of those whose names are enrolled upon the records of the teacher is a waste of the outlay which is made for their benefit. Besides, remissness in this respect is an injury to the schools, as well as to the schol-It interferes seriously with the progress of the classes, induces hesitancy in the recitations, and a waning of interest among the pupils. That a high standard of attendance should be sought for by all, will be admitted to be a sound maxim of policy and interest. And to promote this, the rule is enforced

of requiring from parents written notes, recognizing and accounting for the absence of their children; and where such absence is continued for a period of more than three days, a written permit from the local Committee is required, before the scholar can return to the school. The forfeiture of class rank, which is an internal regulation, is also found to be productive of some good. But with all these regulations, which are more or less effective, the number of absences is greater than it should be; and has even increased for the last three years. We urge, therefore, upon parents a personal interest in the attendance of their children, and an endeavor to avoid all unneccessary detentions and absences. The evil we complain of is that of irregular attendance, rather than of non attendance; and it must be attributed to one of two causes, -sickness or In either case, the parents must be cognizant of the fact, and to them we must look to remedy the evil, whenever it falls within their control.

TARDINESS.

In this matter, a decided improvement has been witnessed. Indeed, the diminution in tardinesses has rather exceeded the aggregate increase in the number of absences. And particularly is this true in relation to the High School, where the rule which has been adopted by the Principal, has tended very sensibly to promote punctuality, and, at the same time, to diminish the number of absences. If the future operation of this rule shall be found to be favorable, we should approve its adoption in all our schools.

TRUANCY,

A few cases of truancy have come to our notice, and some of these have been of an aggravated character; but an attempt has been made to remedy the evil, and not without the hope of a favorable result. Should such cases continue, and be found incurable, we shall feel compelled, either to report them to the Town, to be acted upon, or to fall back upon the provision of the General Statutes, and enter complaints against the delinquents. No scholar has a right to persist in a course which breaks up entirely the harmony of the school, interferes with its order, and impedes its progress; and we look with confidence to the co-operation of all good citizens, in checking this evil wherever it may appear.

PREVALENCE OF THESE EVILS.

Of the evils here noted, it may be proper to remark, that they will be found, as a general rule, to prevail more extensively in the lower than in the higher departments of our schools. Thus, in the Primary Schools, the number of absences and of tardinesses is greater than in the Intermediate Schools; in the Intermediate, it is greater than in the Grammar Schools; and in these, it is greater than in the High School. advance in years and experience, they learn to appreciate the advantages of knowledge, and the number in attendance is so sifted down, and the spirit of emulation is so increased, that there is a laudable desire on the part of each pupil to be punctual at school, and to rank well in the class. in our Primary Schools, more regularity of attendance could be secured, were parents as interested for their children as they should be. It is here that the foundation of all knowledge is laid; and neglect at this period is sure to be attended with future indifference, and loss of the benefits which would otherwise accrue. We would urge, therefore, upon all who have children in the Primary Schools, the great importance of Every consideration of humanity their punctual attendance. appeals to us, to bring all our children under the influence of an enlightened school training; for, "A man who cannot read," says President Wayland, "is a being not contemplated by the genius of our institutions."

PROFANE AND VULGAR LANGUAGE,

We believe it to be a part of the purpose of our schools, to train children to regard the principles of morality, and to inculcate upon them reverence for God, and a faithful obedience to all his laws. And in making this statement, we are sustained by a provision in the laws of the State, which enjoins on all "Instructors of youth to exert their best endeavors to impress on the minds of children and youth committed to their care and instruction, the principles of piety and justice, and a sacred regard to truth; love of their country, humanity, and universal benevolence; sobriety, industry, and frugality; chastity, moderation, and temperance; and those other virtues which are the ornament of human society, and the basis upon which a rebublican constitution is founded; and it shall be the duty of such instructors to endeavor to lead their pupils, as their ages and capacities will admit, into a clear understanding of the tendency of the above mentioned virtues, to preserve and perfect a republican constitution, and secure the blessings of liberty, as well as to promote their future happiDigitized by the Medford Historical Society and Museum

ness, and also to point out to them the evil tendency of the opposite vices."

In view of this enactment, and of the principles it involves, we cannot but lament the prevalence of profanity on the part of so many of the boys in our schools. This is an evil which should not pass unoticed; and we feel constrained, as the public conservators and guardians of the morality of the schools, to bear our testimony against this vice. Little, we know, can be expected of children, where the example of the father is defective; and it may be that some of the profanity we hear is learned at home. But vice is contagious, and like the leaven hid in the measures of meal, its influence will be felt throughout the mass. By the Christian philanthopist,—indeed, by every citizen who is a lover of good order, and who delights in the purity of social intercourse, the prevalence of profane and indecent language must be regarged as a positive evil. Education itself is a blight and a curse, if it is not accompanied with sound moral principles; for the power of a bad man to injure his fellows is in proportion to his intelligence, rather than to his ignorance. Our school system, therefore, should be jealously watched in its effects on the conduct and habits of the children; and so far as purity of speech and of life can be promoted in the schools, by precept and example, these ends should be sedulously sought. But here, as in relation to absences and tardinesses, we must insist upon the importance of parental co-operation; and if fathers and mothers would have their children grow up to be good citizens, honored, respected, and beloved by all, they must feel that a part of the responsibility rests upon them; nay, the training of home is even of greater importance than the training of the school.

SINGING AND OTHER EXERCISES.

The introduction of singing into our schools, is believed to be of great benefit, as involving a salutary effect upon the scholars. As a general thing, they are interested in the exercise; they enter into it with hearty good will; and it leaves an impression on their susceptible minds, which, if deepened in other ways, can scarcely fail to be powerful for good. The Committee have aimed, therefore, in the selection of new teachers, to secure the services of such as could sing, or at least take the lead in so important an exercise; and if the gymnastic exercises, which have been introduced, and are fast becoming popular, are also attended to, we shall find that we have added to the other appliances of a good education, two

things which bear directly upon the moral elevation and physical health of every child; and we believe that such agencies are as pleasing as they are profitable to all who are brought within the scope of their influence.

GRADING OF THE SCHOOLS.

The grading of the schools is now so efficient as to leave very little to be desired in addition. In some cases, as in the Centre and Everett Grammar Schools, and in one or more of the Primary Schools, the number of pupils in attendance is so large, as to render the labors of the teachers very burdensome; and it may be necessary, ere long, to provide a remedy, by establishing a new school in some part of the town. ent, however, the schools that we have can be made to answer. These are divided into four classes, - Primary, Intermediate, Grammar, and High; and in them, the rank is according to attainments,— according to the proficiency which the scholars have made. There is a great disproportion between the number of scholars in the Primary and Intermediate Schools, - perhaps greater than there should be; but the average here, and in the Grammar and High Schools — if we reckon the number of children assigned to each teacher - is about the same. Whether it may not be expedient to check, in some measure, the tendency which exists, to pass rapidly from the Intermediate to the Grammar School, is a point which the Committee will seriously consider,—and perhaps by this course, a more even distribution of the scholars may be secured. score of economy, the arrangement now existing is the best that can be made; and the tendency of the plan of graded schools, is to elevate the standard of public instruction, and concentrate the labors of the several teachers upon classes of corresponding character and attainments. The principle of the division of labor holds good in schools, as in mechanical in dustry; and system is as important in the one as in the other.

GRADUAL PROGRESS.

It is easier, as every one knows, to find fault than to appreciate virtue; but as we believe in the gradual improvement of society, so we believe in the gradual improvement of schools. We do not expect that everything in the school room will move with the precision of a machine; neither do we expect that teachers will find brains where brains are lacking, or that they will excite dullness to unusual precocity. But we do expect fidelity and good management; a desire and an endeavor to accomplish whatever is practicable; and

that hearty engagedness in the work of instruction which is the guaranty of success. In these respects, we are happy to say, that we see very little to cause dissatisfaction; and in point of efficiency and of scholarly attainment, we have much to be thankful for. Our school houses are respectable in appearance, and convenient in arrangement; and the schools themselves are in good working order. Our teachers are active; and appearances indicate that a good work is being done.

COMPLAINTS.

In a very few cases, complaints have been made, and charges of partiality and severity preferred; but these, when investigated, have been found to have been exaggerated. That teachers may err, we are ready to admit; and in considering how easy it is to misjudge, it would not be strange if parents erred, too, in catching so eagerly at the reports of their children, and making them the ground of an open opposition. Wherever there have been collisions, or clashings of opinion, it has been the endeavor of the Committee to act with prudence, calmness, and forbearance; and we have reason to believe that our endeavors in this regard have been usually attended with favorable results. We know of no serious disturbance in the schools; and a good degree of harmony prevails between teachers and scholars, and teachers and parents, and between teachers and scholars and parents, and the Commit-

DEATH OF MR. PORTER.

We have to regret that one of our number, George D. Porter, Esq., has, in the Providence of Almighty God, been removed from us by death within the past year. He was well known to all the inhabitants of this town, as a useful, talented and respectable citizen; and his early departure is lamented by his associates, and by the community at large, as well as by the circle of his relatives and friends. His interest in the schools was ever apparent; and his advice on the Board was highly esteemed.

SPECIAL APPROPRIATIONS.

The special appropriations made by the town at its last annual meeting, of \$300.00, to furnish new seats for the Centre Grammar School, and of \$225.00 for a branch Grammar School at the Swan School House, have not been touched; for the reasons, that, in the former case, the Committee, on consultation, were of opinion that the seats could be made to

last yet longer, with some repairs, and they were reluctant to spend where retrenchment could be made; and in the latter case, the anticipated increase in the number of scholars has not been so great as to require any enlargement of the present accommodations. It will probably be necessary during the present year, to make some changes in these or like particulars; we would, therefore, ask for a renewal of the appropriations. We would remark in this connection, that there has been an increase in the expenditure for School purposes this year, growing out of a law passed by the Legislature of 1861, requiring all changes in books for the school to be made at the expense of the town. Had it not been for this, the expense in full would have been much less, but with this addition it has fallen within the appropriations made.

In conclusion, we submit the following Abstract of the Monthly Reports, and recommend the following appropriations for the support of Schools for the ensuing year:

LIBRARY COMMITTEE.

During the past year, the Library has been increased by the purchase of one hundred and ninety-eight volumes; also, by donations from Dr. Bemis and Alfred Brooks, Esq., whose example in this regard is worthy of imitation.

The number of volumes belonging to the Library, including some worn out by use and others supposed to be lost, is about

two thousand and five hundred.

Our room in the railway station becoming too small, one much more ample and convenient was secured upon the second

floor of the Medford Exchange.

The original catalogue having been some years out of print, and there being about five hundred volumes not on any printed list, we have provided a new catalogue of sixty-three pages, embracing all the books now belonging to the Library. We have also taken advantage of the opportunity thus afforded to alter some of the regulations, and to add other new ones, such as experience has taught to be necessary for the most impartial distribution of the books, and their better preservation. And it is hoped the rules, old and new, will all so commend themselves to the judgments of persons visiting the rooms, as to secure a strict and cordial compliance therewith; and that no patron will claim indulgences which cannot with propriety be granted to all.

It is very desirable that ladies should, if possible, make all their exchanges of books in the afternoon, as the crowd sometimes present in the evening is too great to make the room a

convenient or a proper place for them.

The number of volumes taken from the Library each year

is supposed to be about ten thousand.

The number of inmates at the Almshouse at the present The average number has been 18. time is 16. No deaths have occurred in the past year, and the health of the inmates is good. They are very comfortably situated in the new house, and have been well fed and kindly cared for by Mr. and Mrs. Burridge, the keeper and matron, who have done all in their power to make the inmates contented and happy. the imates are too old to perform any kind of labor, still there has been great improvement on and about the farm, quite a large piece of land (about 3 acres) has been cleared of brush and stones, and has been ploughed the past season, so that it can be planted next Spring. We have been called upon to assist 20 families, outside the Almshouse, and we have also lodged and fed, or assisted, 783 poor travellers. statement it will be seen that the expenses outside of the Almshouse have been large. When the new house was ready to be occupied, we were obliged to purchase many new things, such as stoves, furniture, &c., which has made the expenses of this year, for this department, more than it would have been under ordinary circumstances. We have paid many old bills which have been standing for years for lawsuits, support of paupers, &c., in other cities and towns, which bills do not properly belong to this year's expenses.

Whole expense of the department for the year \$2,196 63 being \$303 37 less than the appropriation, which was \$2,500 00.

Soon after we came into office we were obliged to spend quite a sum of money for breaking out the roads, which had been blocked up by the heavy falls of snow, and when the spring opened we found the roads in a very bad condition. We have done our best to repair and put in good order the roads of the Town, and we believe the roads are in better condition at the present time than they have been for several years. To the expenses of this department should be added board of teamster and horse at almshouse, and labor performed by inmates to amount of \$282 00.

We think it would be for the interest of the Town to purchase a gravel bank in the east part of the Town, and we would recommend that an appropriation be made for that pur-

MIDDLESEX STREET.

By a vote of the Town we were instructed to build the street in continuation of Middlesex Street to South Street. We have attended to that duty, and the whole expense of the same has been thus far, for land damage, building the street and fencing, \$865,98. The amount appropriated was \$1000. The street is completed, with the exception of a short piece opposite the house of Mr. Holmes, on which an injunction has been served which has prevented the completion of the street as laid out.

BRIDGE.

We were instructed to build sidewalks on the Draw Bridge, but believing that the Town will see the importance of lowering the bridge in the Spring, which can be done at a small expense, we have done nothing, believing that it would better to have the whole job done at the same time. We would recommend an appropriation of \$500 for altering the draw and building the sidewalks, and the Board of Surveyors of Highways for the ensuing year, with the Selectmen, be instructed to make the alteration.

OF THE

COMMITTEE ON REBUILDING ALMSHOUSE.

The Committee chosen by the Town, to rebuild the Almshouse, were unable at the last Annual Town Meeting, in March, to make a full report of the expenses of rebuilding, as the work was not then completed. Since that time the Almshouse has been completed, also a new Barn, very thoroughly built, with arrangements within it, to accomodate various needs of the establishment, and also a new Building, entirely separate from the other Buildings, which was considered neccessary by the "Overseers of the Poor," for the purpose of a Lodging Room, for transient comers, also for a "Lock-up," Carriage House, &c. There has also been completed, a large "Reservoir," for water, convenient to the Buildings, to be used in case of fire. Also, a more complete and substantial arrangement for supplying the Almshouse with water, which is circulated in pipes through the building, wherever it is most The ground, also, under and around the Buildings, The entire expense of has been improved by underdraining. everything relating to this work, amounts to \$6,969.25, which amount has been drawn from the treasury, and youchers for the payment of the same, submitted to the Selectmen.

This expenditure is much larger, than was supposed at first, would be neccessary; it has been caused, in part, from the unfavorable season in which the work was done, and from considerable extra work, considered neccessary by the "Overseers

of the Poor," which was not at first contemplated.

We have the satisfaction, however, of believing, that this Town has an Almshouse, that is most substantially built, comfortable and convenient; of suitable size for the present and prospective wants of the Town, and which may be considered in itself, a model Building of its kind.

REPORT OF A COMMITTEE

ON

PURCHASING A STEAM FIRE ENGINE.

The Committee appointed by the Town at the annual Town Meeting, March 11, 1861, to purchase a Steam Fire Engine, and to sell one of the Hand Engines, beg leave to Report; that they procured an Engine from the Portland Co., of Portland Me., and one from the Manchester Manufacturing Co., of Manchester, N. H. for trial, and after the trial of both Engines, they decided that the Manchester Engine was best adapted to the use of the Town, and accordingly purchased her at a cost of \$2,750.00, they have also purchased a Hose Carriage, at a cost of \$100.00 - an Express Wagon as a tender to convey water and coal, at a cost of \$60.00 - Four Water Casks at an expense of \$5.32—Expenses paid the Portland Co. for transportation of their Engine from Boston and back, for trial \$16.00—Travelling expenses of the Committee to Manchester and back, twice, \$21.00 - Advertising Engine No. 2, for sale, in the Boston Herald and Journal, \$55.83 making a sum total of \$3,008.15.

We have sold Engine No. 2, to Benjamin Britnall of Charlestown, Mass., for the sum of \$575.00; she is to go to the City of San Francisco, Cal., we have also sold the Runners belonging to her, to the Town of Somerville, for the sum of \$25.00.

The Committee are so well satisfied with the working of the Steam Engine, that they deem it inexpedient to construct a Reservoir, the present year, as recommended by the Town March 11, 1861.

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you are directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Medford, qualified by law to vote in elections to meet in the TOWN HALL, in said Medford, on

- 4th.—To determine on the amount of money to be raised by taxation, to defray Town charges the ensuing year. Also, for the payment of Town debt, and to make appropriations for the same.
- 5th.-To determine on the method by which the highways shall be repaired the ensuing year.
- 6th.—To determine on the method by which Taxes shall be collected, and paid into the Treasury, the ensuing year.
- 7th .- To fix the compensation to be allowed Town Officers, the ensuing year.
- 8th .- To see if the Town will have a Bell rung daily, and at what hours, the ensuing year.
