REPORT OF THE SELECTMEN,

FOR THE YEAR ENDING FEB. 1, 1864.

In submitting our Annual Report to the Town, we hoped to be able to congratulate you on the return of peace to our distracted country; but Providence has otherwise ordered. Our victories in the field the past year, have been such as to encourage us in the hope, that ere another year shall pass away, we may all rejoice in a reunited and happy country. But to insure a result so desirable, demands of every citizen his most earnest co-operation in furnishing the Government with men and means for a vigorous prosecution of the war.

Early in the season the Town was called upon to furnish, by draft, sixty-four men; to obtain these ninety-six men were drawn, under the direction of the Provost Marshal at Lawrence, July 13th. Of this number one only reported for duty

and is now in the service, viz.: -

At a Town meeting held April 6, 1863, A. H. Butters, A. N. Cotton, Wm. B. Thomas, S. C. Lawrence, T. S. Harlow, John Vialle, Francis Brooks, John Stetson, George Curtis, H. D. Hall, D. W. Lawrence, and H. H. Gilmore, were chosen a Committee to make arrangements for the reception of the Medford Light Infantry, Capt. Currier, on their return from the war, having performed the nine months' service, for which they enlisted, in a manner honorable to their country, their town, and themselves, discharging every duty with

fidelity and promptness.

At a meeting of the Committee, General Samuel C. Lawrence was chosen Chairman, and the following arrangements were made. On their arrival at the wharf in Boston, June 26th, the sick were furnished with carriages, those able to march proceeded to Charlestown, where they partook of a collation furnished by the hospitality of the city. They were then provided with conveyance to Pearl St., Medford, where they were received by the present and past officers of the Town, citizens and members of the Fire Department, escorted by the National Lancers, Capt. Slade, of Boston, who had, with a generosity characteristic of them, tendered their services for the occasion. After marching down Main St., to Ship St., through Pleasant, Washington, and Salem Streets, to the Town Hall, the company was formally received by General S. C. Lawrence, in behalf of the Town, which was responded to by Capt. Currier, in behalf of his company.

They were then invited to partake of a collation arranged by the ladies, after which they were dismissed, and the ceremonies of the day ended, we trust, to the mutual satisfaction

of all concerned.

The liberality of the citizens in contributing money to defray expenses, and the assistance rendered by the ladies in arranging the tables, were most gratifying to the Committee.

We think some action should be taken, by the town, to perpetuate the memory of those who have fallen, or may hereafter fall, in defence of our Union.

We would recommend that a Committee be appointed to consider and report some plan for this purpose.

Oct. 17, 1863, the President again called for 300,000 men, by voluntary enlistment; forty-eight of that number was assigned as the quota of Medford.

At a Town meeting held on the 3d day of November, E. Boynton, jr., D. W. Lawrence, and Charles Currier, were chosen a Committee to aid the Selectmen in raising the number of men required. A recruiting-office was opened in the Committee Room, in Town House, and every means used in their power, assisted by a Committee appointed by the enrolled men, with material aid furnished by the citizens of the Town.

STATE AID.

In disbursing State Aid we have thought proper to continue the very liberal policy adopted by our predecessors, feeling confident that the Town would willingly assume whatever amount the State refuses to refund.

By the account as audited by the State Auditor of last year, it is apparent that the State will only refund the amount which

the law in its strictest construction allows.

We would therefore recommend that the Town authorize the Selectmen to pay whatever in their judgment is necessary for the support of families of volunteers, without regard to what the State may allow.

Applications have been made during the year by citizens whose residences are contiguous to the line of gas-pipe, to be allowed to put up lamp-posts at their own expense, the Town to pay for the gas consumed. We recommend that the Selectmen be authorized to grant permission whenever, in their judgment, it would be for the interest of the public.

LOCK-UP.

The condition of the lock-up is as good as can be expected in its present location, which is entirely unfit for the purpose, and we would suggest that some action be taken by the town to procure a more suitable place.

EXAMINATIONS AND EXHIBITIONS.

The first examinations were made in the month of July, by printed questions, and were confined, as usual, to the High School, and the higher classes of the Grammar Schools. The annual exhibitions were then attended by the whole Board and a large number of friends. At the close of these was an exhibition of the High School, in the Town Hall. At this exhibition a class of seven—two young gentlemen and five young ladies—received, through the Chairman of the Board certificates showing that they had completed the prescribed course of studies pursued in the High School, and with this testimony were honorably dismissed. This pleasant feature we hope to continue in future similar exhibitions. The re-

cent examinations of the schools in January were attended and conducted by the Board, and proved, on the whole, satisfactory.

CHANGES.

It was recommended in the report of last year, to establish a new Grammar School, in the Cradock Schoolhouse, for which purpose, as well as the furnishing of a room for another Primary School, said building has been enlarged by the addition of a new wing. The immediate necessity for this was seen in the fact that a large proportion of the scholars heretofore attending the Centre Grammar School, in the High School building, resided in the Cradock district; and it was also desirable that school accommodations should be brought nearer to those residing in the vicinity of Winter

Hill and Willow Bridge.

It is proper, in this connection, to remark, that a petition was received from those residing near the above-named localities, to establish a school in their neighborhood. committee, considering the small number of scholars of all ages, who would attend such a school, judged it best not to establish it at present. The subject of an additional Grammar School is also postponed; and to meet the necessity which has been referred to, the Centre Grammar School has been transferred to the Cradock Schoolhouse, and now bears the name of the Cradock Grammar School. formerly occupied by this school is still vacant, the wisdom of recommending the providing of a new room might be On this point we would say that it was absoquestioned. lutely necessary that a room should be furnished for another Primary School, in the Cradock district. purpose the schoolhouse in said district must be enlarged, which could not be done without adding other rooms, which would ultimately be required for a Grammar School. thermore, it had become necessary to refurnish the Centre Grammar School room, the expense of which was spared, by furnishing instead the new rooms in the Cradock building.

The necessity may arise, during the year, of establishing a Branch Grammar School, in the Centre Grammar School room,

for which an appropriation is desired.

During the past year the following changes of teachers have taken place. The Principal of the Brooks Grammar School, Miss E. P. Winning, resigned early in the year, and was succeeded by Miss Sarah A. Fales. The Principal of the Centre, now Cradock Grammar School, Mr. Geo. R. Bradford, whose success for the past six years has been a source of

gratification to the Committee and the Town, resigned in the month of October, and was succeeded by Mr. Chas. A. Horne, who also recently resigned, and his place is now filled by Mr. Samuel C. Hunt. Miss Mary C. Hayden, Principal of the Osgood Primary School, resigned in November, and Miss Hattie O. Emery fills her place.

A new Primary School was established in the Cradock district early in June, which occupied temporarily the hall of the engine-house, on Union Street, and at the commencement of the fall term, was placed in its new schoolroom in the Cradock building. This school is under the care of Miss

Addie E. Deane.

In accordance with a Statute Law, the children of indigent parents are furnished with the necessary school-books by the Town; and others, who do not furnish books for their children, will have them furnished for them, by order of the School Committee, the expense of which will be added to their taxes.

RULES AND REGULATIONS.

The Committee have taken pains to revise the rules and regulations of the schools, a list of which is herewith transmitted.

TEACHERS.

SECT. 1. All Teachers are required to make themselves acquainted with these regulations, and to devote themselves to their duties.

2. All the schoolrooms shall be opened, and the Principals

and Assistants shall be present, both morning and afternoon, fifteen minutes before the time fixed for the session to begin; and the pupils shall be in their seats, and the exercises of the schools shall commence and close punctually at the prescribed hours. Every pupil entering the school after the hour of opening, whether bringing an excuse or not, shall be considered tardy, and so marked in the Register. The bell shall be rung five minutes before the hour of opening.

3. The Teachers are requested to open their schools by reading a portion of the Bible, and then repeating the Lord's Prayer. Once a week the Ten Commandments shall be repeated, either by one pupil or by a class, or by the whole

school in concert.

4. The Teachers, in each schoolhouse, are required to give all their female pupils a recess together, and to give a

recess, at a different time, to all their male pupils.

5. No teacher shall, upon any pretence whatever, be absent from the school under his or her charge, without permission from the Special Committee, who may procure a substitute for the absent Teacher, and decide upon the com-

pensation to be paid such substitute.

6. No Teacher shall be allowed to change the hours of keeping school, or to begin or dismiss school at any other time than that appointed by the Committee, without special permission. All the schools, except the High School, shall keep two sessions. The morning session shall commence at nine o'clock, through the year; and the afternoon session, from the first of April until the first of November, at two o'clock, and through the rest of the year at half-past one.

7. Teachers shall give such oral instruction as will enable their pupils to obtain a clear comprehension of their lessons. Thoroughness to be always a primary object. It is recommended that lessons in "Object Teaching" be given every morning and afternoon in each Primary School, and twice a

week in each Intermediate School.

8. In all the schools in which Assistants are employed the Principal shall be recognized as the head of the school, and all his directions, not inconsistent with these regulations,

shall be obeyed by the Assistant.

9. The Teachers shall practise such discipline in their schools as would be exercised by a judicious parent in a family, and shall avoid corporal punishment in all cases where good order can be preserved by milder means; but when corporal punishment shall be deemed necessary, it may be resorted to, and a record thereof, with the cause of punishment, shall be made, and kept for examination.

Teachers shall, as far as practicable, exercise a general

supervision over their pupils while going to school and re-

turning home.

10. For violent opposition or open rebellion, the Teacher may dismiss the pupil from school, and shall then immediately inform the parent or guardian of such pupil, and on the same day shall apply to the Special Committee for advice and direction.

11. When the example of any pupil is very injurious to the welfare of the school, and in all cases where reformation appears hopeless, it shall be the duty of the Teacher, with the approbation of the Special Committee, to suspend such pupil from the school. But any pupil, under this public censure, who shall have expressed to the Teacher his or her sorrow for such misconduct, as publicly and explicitly as the nature of the case may require, shall, with the consent of the Committee, be reinstated in school, with all its privileges.

12. When pupils have failed to learn the lessons assigned them, the Teacher may detain them after school-hours, not exceeding twenty minutes, provided the Teacher remains

with the pupils so detained, but not otherwise.

13. It shall be the duty of the Teachers to send down to a lower class all such pupils as, from repeated absences or any other cause, are unable to sustain the average standing of their class, and, when sufficiently prepared for the change,

pupils may be promoted to higher classes.

All Teachers are required to obey faithfully the following statute of the Commonwealth (v. Rev. Stat. Chap. xxiii., Sect. 7): "It shall be the duty of all instructors of youth to exert their best endeavors to impress on the minds of children and youth committed to their care and instruction, the principles of piety, justice, and a sacred regard to truth, love to their country, humanity, and universal benevolence, sobriety, industry, and frugality, chastity, moderation, and temperance, and those other virtues which are the ornament of human society, and the basis upon which a republican constitution is founded. And it shall be the duty of such instructors to endeavor to lead their pupils, as their ages and capacities will admit, into a clear understanding of the tendency of the above-mentioned virtues, to preserve and perfect a republican constitution, and to secure the blessings of liberty, as well as to promote their future happiness, and also to point out to them the evil tendency of the opposite vices." It is recommended to each Teacher to adopt such a systematic course of instruction in Christian morals as shall secure the great objects contemplated in the above statute. Manual of Morals for Schools," Cowdrey's and "Wayland's Moral Science for Schools," are books which may be used as aids or class-books.

In all schools of the same grade the corresponding classes shall pursue simultaneously the same studies from the same

text-books.

15. The Principal of the High School and the Principals of the Grammar Schools are required to hear the recitations of the third and fourth classes in their respective schools as often as once a fortnight, and said Principals shall be respon-

sible for the conduct and progress of said classes.

16. Each Teacher in every school shall keep a Register, in which shall be recorded the names, ages, dates of admission and places of residence of the pupils. In addition to this register, other records shall be kept, in which shall be entered the daily absence of the pupils, and such notes of their class exercises as may exhibit a view of their advancement and standing. At the end of every quarter a record of the relative rank of each pupil, except those in the Primary Schools, shall be sent to the Committee by their Teachers.

17. Any Teacher may visit, once in three months, any of the public schools of the Town, for the purpose of observing the modes of instruction and discipline, having previously an-

nounced such visit to the Special Committee.

18. No Teacher shall dismiss a pupil before the appointed time for dismissing the school, except in case of sickness or some pressing emergency, or a written request signed by the parent or guardian of such pupil, and every dismission, from any cause, shall be recorded in the Register and reported to the Committee.

19. Teachers are especially required to attend to the proper ventilation of their schoolrooms, changing the air in them at every recess, and at the close of each session. Physical and gymnastic exercises are urgently recommended for

every school.

20. The Teachers are required to see that the school-houses, and all property belonging to them, under their respective control, are not in any manner defaced or injured by the pupils, or other persons; and they shall personally examine the schoolhouses and outbuildings as often as may be necessary, to inform themselves of their condition, and report the same to the Committee.

21. Each Teacher is required to see that the door of his or her schoolhouse, and the gates leading thereto, are locked,

on leaving the premises at night.

22. Teachers are requested to keep in their possession a key to their room or rooms; and they shall keep said rooms locked during their absence, except when otherwise ordered.

23. The Rules and Regulations shall be read aloud by the Teacher in each school once in six months.

PUPILS.

24. No child shall be admitted into any of the public schools without a permit from the Special Committee of the district in which the child resides; and no child shall be entitled to receive such permit until satisfactory evidence be given that such child has been vaccinated, or otherwise secured against the small-pox. If the Special Committee be absent, any other member of the Board may grant admission.

25. No pupils shall be allowed to retain their connection with the public schools, unless they are furnished with the books and utensils required to be used in the respective

classes.

26. Every pupil shall be required to attend school as constantly as possible, and, in case of tardiness or absence, to furnish to the Teacher satisfactory evidence that such tardiness or absence was indispensably necessary. Providential detention shall be the only excuse for tardiness. Prompt obedience to the Teacher is required from every pupil.

27. Whenever any pupil shall have been absent from the High, Grammar, or Intermediate school four successive days, it shall be the duty of the Teacher to give immediate notice to the parents of such pupil, and said pupil may, at the discretion of the Teacher, be suspended from school, to be again admitted only upon a written permit, signed by the Special Committee. In keeping the record of absences, children suspended from school shall not be reckoned after the expiration of the four days. All other absences shall be recorded and reported.

28. Every pupil shall be allowed a recess of ten minutes

in each half-day, for recreation in the open air.

29. No pupil may leave the school-grounds during recess.

30. When the schools are dismissed, the pupils are required to depart immediately from the vicinity of the schoolhouses; and they are not permitted to use the grounds about the schoolhouses for a play-ground at any time, except during recess.

31. If any child shall come to the schoolhouse in a filthy

condition, such child shall be sent home to be cleansed.

32. No pupil shall be admitted to the privileges of one school, who has been expelled from another, expect by a vote of the Committee.

33. Any pupil who is guilty of marking, cutting, defacing, or in any way injuring any of the schoolhouses or the outbuildings, or the trees belonging to them, shall subject his or

her parent or guardian to the payment of all damages thus done,—the amount to be determined by the Committee; and shall also be liable to such other punishment as the circum-

stances of the case shall demand.

All pupils are strictly forbidden to climb on any tree, fence, railing, ladder, etc., about the schoolhouse; or to leave whittlings or other rubbish in the play-grounds; or to throw stones, snow-balls, or other missiles, about the neighborhood of the schoolhouse; or to use any profane or indelicate language.

TRANSFERS.

All pupils, to be transferred from the Primary to the Intermediate School, must have a familiar knowledge of the elements of reading, such as the sounds of letters; also a knowledge of the punctuation-marks which occur in their lessons, of the abbreviations, Italic letters, Roman and Arabic. numbers.

All pupils, to be transferred from the Intermediate to the Grammar School, must be familiar with the elements of reading, be able to spell promptly from the speller and their reading-books, to give the sounds of the letters, to read correctly from their highest class-book; must have a thorough knowledge of their manual in arithmetic, and the first ten sections of Colburn's Mental Arithmetic; must be able, in geography, to give the definitions, describe the grand divisions of the globe, with their principal physical features; also the subdivisions of the United States. Some proficiency in drawing maps on the slate and blackboard will be required.

Candidates for admission to the High School, must be able to read fluently and understandingly any lesson in their reading-books, and be familiarly acquainted with the elementary principles of reading; must have a thorough knowledge of the sounds of the language, also of spelling and enunciation, and of the definitions of the words in their reading books. They must pass a satisfactory examination in all the parts of grammar and geography; and in arithmetic they must have . a thorough knowledge of the four simple and compound rules, vulgar and decimal fractions, interest and simple proportion.

The examinations for transfers shall be made by the **3**8. entire Committee, and shall take place at the close of the annual examinations. Examinations for transfers from the Grammar Schools to the High School shall be made by the printed questions used for the examinations in July, and only those pupils shall be admitted who answer correctly the percentage of questions, announced by the Committee at the commencement of the year.

MISCELLANY.

39. The school year shall begin at the expiration of the summer vacation, and shall end on the last Friday in July.

40. The annual examination of all the schools shall be made at the close of the school year, in part orally, and in part by printed questions. The semi-annual examination shall be made in January of each year.

41. At the close of the annual examination, the Committee shall give marks of approbation, in each school, to such pupils as they shall judge, all things considered, to be the

most meritorious.

Examinations in music shall be made semi-annually; and at the examinations in July marks of approbation shall be given to the most deserving.

42. The books used and studies pursued in all the schools shall be such, and such only, as shall be authorized by the

Committee.

43. Pupils not supplied with the requisite books shall be furnished with a certificate to that effect by the Teacher, addressed to the Committee, designating the kind needed; and the Committee shall take measures to supply the same. The Teachers shall in no case furnish the pupils with books, except by request of the parents of such pupils, and at their except by request of the parents of such pupils, and at their except by request of the parents of such pupils, and at their except by request of the parents of such pupils, and at their except by request of the parents of such pupils.

44. The duties of each steward of the different school-houses shall be as follows: To sweep all the rooms and basements twice every week; to clean the house, washing the floors and windows thoroughly twice each year, viz., in vacation-week in May and November; to wash and clean the water-closets as often as necessary; to shovel the snow, and keep the paths open in winter; to keep the gates closed and locked when the school is not in session; to report forthwith to the Teacher and Special Committee any injuries done to the schoolhouse, outbuildings, trees, or fences; to kindle the fires, sift the coal, and burn the cinders; to take the general care and superintendence of the schoolhouse, to the satisfaction of the Committee. No extra payment shall be allowed for any of the above duties.

45. Writing shall be introduced into the first and the sec-

ond classes of the Intermediate Schools.

46. Each pupil in the Primary School may, and each one in the Intermediate School shall, be provided with a slate, and shall employ the time not otherwise occupied in drawing, and in writing words from their lessons. The letters of the alphabet should be written rather than printed.

HOLIDAYS AND VACATIONS. .

47. Every Wednesday and Saturday afternoon; the annual Fast; the Fourth of July; the First of January; the Seventeenth of June; Christmas-day; Thanksgiving week; the last week in February; the last week in May; and at least four weeks in summer, beginning on the Monday succeeding the last Friday in July.

HIGH SCHOOL.

The rare advantages afforded by the High School, the Committee are sorry to say, are withheld from many who most need to enjoy them. Too often lads of a tender age are taken from the wholesome restraints and pleasant influences of school life to engage in mercantile and mechanical pursuits. While many of the studies pursued in the High School are claimed as being of little use to those designing to enter upon these pursuits, a more liberal view of the subject would, we think, lead to a different conclusion. The mind of every one, in its formative period, needs not only those moral influences which shape the future character, but those which cultivate and enrich all the mental faculties. These include the taste, the imagination, as well as the faculty of reasoning. are called ornamental branches are no less useful than those which monopolize the term useful. We find ornament everywhere. Nature reveals to us an unending array of "Strength and beauty are in His sanctuary" whose home is the universe. If use and beauty are thus combined in the works of God, are they not both necessary in the education and life of his creatures. A little knowledge of ancient and modern languages, the higher mathematics, physiology, rhetoric, intellectual and moral philosophy, is by no means "a dangerous thing" even to him who devotes a lifetime to the labor of his hands, or to the business of the merchant. knowledge, in the true view of the case, pays, and pays well. A lifetime reveals a gain instead of a loss. Near at hand may be the time when our towns shall offer in their public schools advantages of intellectual culture approaching far nearer than they now do the magnitude of those offered by higher institutions of learning.

Let not the pursuit of wealth or personal emolument divert attention from the enterprise of the scholar. More attention should be paid to learning in a country like this, whose many undeveloped resources, and whose wide fields, containing "pearls of great price," are inviting us to gather their treas. ures. Let not the quickened interest of freemen, in the progress of our American civilization, exceed that which regards

the interests of learning and science.

Last year the Committee based the qualifications of candidates for the High School upon the results of the examination by printed questions. Twenty-four questions were given to each pupil, of which at least thirteen correct answers were required. Next year the number of questions will be twenty-five, distributed as follows: Arithmetic, six; grammar, seven; geography, six; history, six; of which correct answers will be required, in grammar, five; geography, four; arithmetic and history, three each.

. Though a larger number than usual would be likely to fail of admission on these terms, still the incentive to excellence in scholarship in the Grammar Schools would be made greater, and a decided advantage would accrue to the High School. It is also the design of the Committee; in some way that may yet seem best, to require an additional progress in the studies of the Grammar Schools, that a similar advance may be made

in the High School.

MUSIC.

The introduction of Music into the schools, as a branch of instruction, still proves successful. The labors of Mr. Carey are highly appreciated by the scholars; and the hour of his weekly appointment is anticipated with eager delight. But time alone will show the ultimate advantages to be derived from this department of instruction. Eight years devoted to weekly lessons in Music, which is the full time that a single scholar may enjoy such advantages in our schools, will accomplish much in his individual training. The science of Music thus early and thoroughly taught will, of course, be more widely understood and appreciated. The moral influence of Music as a study, and that associated with other studies in school, should by no means be forgotten. memorics will be revived through life by the never-forgotten songs of the schoolroom. Children cannot be too early taught to sing; and being thus early taught, an additional charm is given to the pleasures of childhood.

OBJECT TEACHING.

This new species of instruction the Committee have recommended as an occasional exercise in the Intermediate and Primary Schools. A little experience has proved it to be not only a source of valuable information to the young pupil, but

a means of pleasant diversion. Continual, uninterrupted hard study, without the motives of riper years, should not at once be required of little children. Let, then, a limited amount be required in the early days of school life; and let every profitable means which serves to make the schoolroom a pleasant resort be invented and used. Object Teaching has its advantages in this respect. It teaches ideas and things, not mere words. By its aid the child sketches, as it were, his knowledge, as the artist does his pictures, from nature and life.

PHYSICAL EXERCISES.

These have long been practised in our lower grades of schools, but have recently been introduced into two of our schools of a higher grade. The advantages of such exercises are numerous. To say nothing of the impulse which they give to physical culture, they afford an agreeable relief to the body during the tedious confinement of school hours. The practice of making children, and especially little children, "keep still" in school is not only an old fashion, but never, we hope, to be a new one. The living body was never made to keep still, until it lies down to its last sleep. The order of the schoolroom is one thing, that of the graveyard is another.

MORAL DISCIPLINE.

In the multiplicity of topics suggested by this report, the last, but by no means least, which we shall introduce, is that of Moral Discipline. Instruction in morals we hold to be more essential than that in any other branch of knowledge. The chief responsibility of this branch of instruction rests with those whose business it is to preach the gospel of Christ and unfold the principles of Christianity, which embrace "all

the law and the prophets."

But a grand means of instruction in morals is the discipline of life. We find among us three principal sources of moral discipline — national government, the family, and the school. If a strict discipline is not maintained by these agencies, we may well despair of any great good resulting from the imparting of the mere theory of morals and religion. The discipline of our youth is that of the home and the schoolroom. If this is properly administered we need have no fears of the government, and we may entertain the most cheerful hope concerning that kingdom "which ruleth over all."

While the School Committee have no authority over the parents of the children intrusted to their supervision and

care, still we need their friendly co-operation, in order to establish in the character and life of the rising generation the principles of morality. Without wholesome home discipline we cannot have perfect discipline in the school. The parent is responsible for the regular and punctual attendance of his children at the public school. He should in every way co-operate with the teacher and the School Committee. No mistaken affection for his child should lead him to be a party with that child against the teacher. In this way much injury has been done. Too much evil has already sprung up from the readiness with which the mere reports of children have been made the basis of complaint against the teacher. In almost every case of this kind, when an investigation has been made by the School Committee, it has been proved that the teacher was right and the scholar and his parents wrong.

We do not mean to say that our teachers are infallible. We have no evidence that they are more than human; but we mean to affirm that children are not the best judges of school discipline, nor the most disinterested reporters of school matters, and that parents are sometimes hasty in judgment, without proper evidence. "A word to the wise is suf-

ficient."

The earnest co-operation of the parent with the teacher will effect a great deal in the work of moral and school discipline. If obedience is inculcated and enforced at home, it will be an easy matter to enforce it in school. If, also, a good example is set by parents and older friends out of school, children are ready imitators, and would soon profit by such example.

Many, we fear, have been too ready to charge the profanity, falsehood, irreverence, and other species of immorality, too prevalent in this Town, upon the teachers of our schools. But so far is this from being the case, that we believe that they have done all they could to promote a pure morality, and, at least, they should not be made wholly responsible for

the morals of the Town.

Still it is our earnest desire and purpose to have the schools of this Town governed by strict disciplinarians, and to have exemplified in them the true principles of moral discipline. In this way much can be done to prepare the youth for the honors, privileges, and duties of the citizen. In this way the cause of education and good government is promoted. In this way, too, the moral discipline of life is effectually aided.

Your Committee recommend the appropriation of the following sums, for defraying the expenses of our schools for

the year ensuing: -

OF THE

LIBRARY COMMITTEE.

In the estimation of your Committee, the ends for which the Library was established have, for the past year, been accomplished in an eminent degree.

More persons have taken books than in any preceding year; and the whole number of volumes charged has been, by actual

count, thirteen thousand five hundred.

Two hundred and five volumes have been added, of which seven were the donation of Miss Helen Bigelow, and two the gift of Charles Monroe, Esq.; and, since the mere use of the Library affords ample remuneration for all the money expended on its account, it is clearly evident that this increase is so much net gain to the property of the town.

The number of volumes now registered is about two thousand eight hundred and seventy-five (2875), and constitutes, as we believe, no insignificant attraction to those who are

seeking a residence in this favored town.

On account of the very high price of books, your Committee have endeavored, though at much expense of time, to purchase only the more choice works, and such, with few exceptions, as were wanted for immediate and constant circulation.

We would recommend that the Town build two Reservoirs the current year,—one on Forest Street, and one at West Medford, the expense of which will probably be about \$800. We would recommend that the members of the department be paid the same as last year,—viz., fifteen dollars and poll tax,—they to pay all their expenses, except Steward's services, and repairs on Engines, Engine Houses, Hose Carriage and Hose, and Hook and Ladder apparatus. We would also recommend that the sum of \$3000 be appropriated for the support of the department the ensuing year.

In consequence of the Treasurer's books not being closed on the first day of February, as they were last year, we include the expenses of the Department for fifteen months.

OVERSEERS OF THE POOR

In submitting our Report of the condition and expense of this department for the year, we are pleased to report that, considering the large increase in price of every article of subsistence, the result will compare favorably with any previous year. It is true that this department has rendered less assistance to the Highway Department this year than it did last year, yet the material and creditable improvements on the The inmates of the farm will more than counterbalance it. Almshouse are as comfortable and happy as an institution of the kind can make them, being under the immediate care of Mr. and Mrs. James T. White, who are entitled to much praise for their creditable manner of exercising the three prime requisites in an Almshouse; viz., cleanliness, kindness, and econ-The present number of inmates is fourteen, the average for the year having been fifteen; three have died; viz., Z. Shedd, Thomas Debbins, Catherine Tazzard. We believe the farm, under a wise and energetic administration, will prove a good investment to the Town. Mr. White has conducted it wisely and well, evincing rare qualifications for the duties of his position.

We have rendered partial support to eighteen families outside the Almshouse this year, and rendered temporary assistance to two hundred and thirty (230) wayfarers. We are gratified to see that while there is a large increase of travel by every other mode of conveyance, this line of travel is becoming unpopular. In the following statement of the expense of this department, two hundred and seventy dollars seventy-six cents (\$270.76) was paid for debts contracted for, and should have been included in the expense of last year. There are no outstanding debts against this department, we believe, and there is a balance due us from the town of Stoneham, to which we refer our successors.

It cannot be expected that the affairs of this department will be more wisely managed the coming than they have been the present year, therefore we would recommend that the sum of twenty-five hundred dollars be appropriated to defray the expense of this department.

HIGHWAY SURVEYORS.

Owing to the insufficient appropriation of the preceding year, and a very mild and open winter, the Highway Surveyors, on assuming the charge submitted to them, found it necessary to expend in March and April, to much disadvantage, nearly one-half the appropriation, to save the Town from being prosecuted, the roads in many places being nearly impassable to loaded teams.

The amount expended this year, though somewhat in excess of the appropriation, has by no means been sufficient to affect that "extensive repairing" prophesied by the retiring

Board last year.

So desirable a result we have failed to accomplish, for the simple yet potent reason, that the Town has no material accessible, without costing fourfold more than it should. The attention of the Town has been repeatedly called to the necessity of some action, whereby a supply of gravel can be obtained for the Highways, but the recommendations have been unheeded, and will be probably till the depletion of the Treasury teaches them the wisdom of such action. We urge this for the consideration of the Town, for such negligence has cost the Town this year certainly twenty per cent of its appropriation, and we submit it as a question too vital to be trifled with any longer.

It is evident that the Highway Surveyors have for a long time had an abiding faith in field-stone as a suitable material for road-structure, and, suffering from want of gravel, the road

presents an uneven and jolting surface.

We hope this stone-mania is over, and that the Town will provide such material that the rough places may be made smooth.

For a few years past the Tufts heirs have generously allowed the Surveyors to excavate valuable road material from a bluff on the northerly side of Winter Hill, but having effected a division of the estate, the said bluff falls in possession of George F. Tufts, who agrees to guarantee to the Town the full right to remove all, or any part thereof, within three years next ensuing, if the Town will accept so much of Dexter Street as lies between Main and Medford Streets, being some forty rods in length. We recommend the Town to accept of the offer, for it is valuable material, and will subject the Town to but little expense.

We have exceeded the appropriation \$796.79, being compelled to pay fifty per cent more for labor than it could be obtained for the year previous, when the Highway Department received considerable assistance from the Almshouse

Department which this year has been quite small.

At your annual meeting in March last, you very wisely appointed a Committee to construct and arrange in the Town House a suitable place to deposit and arrange the contents of the safe in said building. But in that pathway of duty they have thus far been guided by sight only, for at this late day there is no suitable, accessible place for either the Board of Overseers of the Poor or Highway Surveyors to deposit their books, blanks, etc., subjecting them to an annoyance this year, that we hope will not be imposed on our successors. We regret the necessity that compels us to complain; but it moves us to see the growing want of appreciation of the honors the Town lavishes so freely.

In using the appropriations generously made by the Town, the Surveyors have preferred, as far as possible, to expend the moneys entrusted them in constructing culverts, and making improvements of a permanent kind, rather than use the money in other ways, under circumstances so disadvan-

tageous to the Town.

In doing so, it is barely possible that we may have erred; but experience will teach any one who evinces half the disposition to *investigate* that he does to complain that the money has been wisely expended.

We would recommend an appropriation of \$4000 to defray

the expenses of this department the coming year.

TOWN TREASURER.

At the commencement of the financial year which has just closed, there was cash in Treasury \$14,807 69. Said sum being insufficient to meet the current expenses of the Town, it became necessary to borrow money, in anticipation of taxes. I, therefore, with the approval of the Selectmen, borrowed, temporarily, the several sums of two, three, and four thousand dollars, which were promptly paid when the first instalment from the collector was received.

By a vote of the Town at the last annual March meeting, the Treasurer was authorized to borrow the sum of \$10,000 for a term-of five years, to pay the temporary loan at the Eagle Bank. Not readily finding the money at as low rate of interest as was desirable, it was thought best to let it remain in the Eagle Bank, on call, two weeks' notice. On the 4th Dec. last, the President of the Bank called for the money, and as there was a surplus in the Treasury, I paid it, with the approval of the Selectmen.

At a previous Town meeting, the Treasurer was instructed to foreclose the mortgage and take possession of the Real Estate called the Poorhouse lot, sold to T. P. Smith. Agreeably to said note I did, on the 10th day of January, 1863, take possession of said property, and have collected rent monthly.

It has been the custom for the Overseers of the Poor and Surveyors of Highways to draw from the Treasury sums of money, as they required, to defray the expenses of said departments, and give their receipts for the same, with no other security. Such practice, in my judgment, is wrong, and will be discontinued, unless specially authorized by the Town.

A note for \$10,000 will be due to the Warren Institution for Savings, October 6th, 1864, and it becomes necessary for the Town to take action in relation to the payment of the same.

There are several small notes against the Town, which, in my judgment, would be a benefit to the Town if said notes were consolidated, and I would recommend that the Treasurer be authorized to borrow a sufficient sum for a term of years to pay said notes, as they have become very much worn and will have to be renewed if not paid.

For a correct statement of the finances of the Town I will

refer to the Report of the Auditing Committee.

I have received from the Treasurer of the Commonwealth the past year about \$12,000, in soldiers' allotments, and have paid out the same, which has greatly increased the already enhanced responsibilities of the Treasurer.

Your Board would respectfully suggest for the consideration of our successors in office, that they should decrease the valuation on Real Estate, which we think may be done gradually, from year to year, thereby lessening our State and County Tax, which we believe to be larger in proportion than in other towns.

In regard to Suspended and Abated Taxes your Board reported at the Town meeting held November 3d, 1863, that they had examined them for the past twenty years and reported the amount for each year, which amounted in the aggregate to \$1743.30, suggesting that the Town take some action in the matter, which Report was recommitted with instructions that we should recommend some action for the Town to take.

We would therefore recommend to abate all taxes up to the year 1855 as we do not believe any of them will ever be collected.

A Town note for \$10,000 to the Warren Institution for Savings will become due on the 6th day of October next, and we

would recommend that the sum of \$10,000 be raised by taxation to pay said note, and that the demand notes, due sundry persons, amounting to \$2800, be paid from the funds already

in the Treasury.

It gives us pleasure to notice a reduction in the Town Debt by the payment to the Eagle Bank of the temporary loan of \$10,000 from the Treasury, it being unnecessary to make a permanent loan for that amount as was voted, the Town having been reimbursed by the State in the sum of \$6,448.65, being the amount of Military Bounty paid by the Town more than was apportioned as its share by the State.
